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SOUP'S ON!

Fall is here and the cooler temperatures are perfect weather for making a pot of soup. Soup is a great tasting and an economical way to feed your family. Use leftover meat or beans, add some vegetables and pasta to create a "kitchen sink" soup. Make a meal by adding bread or crackers and a salad for a quick and easy supper.


Here is a few tips to make your soup healthier.

- Use reduced-sodium or salt free broth or stocks Broths or stocks add flavor to the soup as a base liquid. Make your own to control the amount of salt used or use more herbs and spices to add flavor without salt.
- Add more vegetables If you want to go "off the recipe," add more vegetables to your soup. Your soup will be heartier, and you will contribute more vitamins, minerals and fiber to your soup.
- **Use evaporated milk in place of cream** Creamy soups tend to be high in fat. Substitute evaporated milk for cream and you will get flavor and thickness in your soup with less fat.
- Add some low cost, high nutrient value ingredients Add dry beans (black, kidney, pinto or navy) or split peas and lentils to your pot of soup. These ingredients are inexpensive and will add protein and fiber to your dish.

If your pot of soup gets too big, freeze the extra for future meals. Use freezer safe containers and allow room for expansion as the soup freezes. Thaw frozen soup in the refrigerator when you are ready to use it. Enjoy the recipe.

Recent Highlights

held at the end of August during the Highland County Fair, was a strong success thanks to the dedication of youth exhibitors and the support of the community. This year, 33 youth—including eight first-year participants—sold 110 animals for a total of \$167,988. To participate, exhibitors were required to complete a Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) training, take part in at least six 4-H or FFA activities, and spend months caring for and preparing their animals for the show and sale. These expectations teach valuable lessons in responsibility, perseverance, and leadership. The success of this event also reflects the strong network of buyers, sponsors, volunteers, and families who stand behind Highland's youth. From providing resources

and expertise to cheering from the stands, this community effort highlights the continued commitment to supporting young people and sustaining Highland County's agricultural heritage for generations to come.



The 4-H In-School Enrichment Program has returned to Bath and Highland County Public Schools for the 2025-2026 school year, continuing a long-standing partnership that connects classroom learning with hands-on experiences. Through this collaboration, 4-H builds meaningful relationships with local youth while supporting teachers by providing engaging, standards-based activities that bring science and practical skills to life. This year, third graders will explore the world of simple machines, discovering how tools like levers and pulleys make work easier, while fourth and sixth graders will dive into the scientific method through classroom experiments that prepare them for participation in a spring 4-H Science Fair. Fifth graders will learn about circuitry and energy through the "Magic of Electricity" program, and seventh graders in Bath County will take part in Teen Cuisine, gaining valuable lessons in nutrition, cooking skills, and food safety. Together, these experiences encourage curiosity, critical thinking, and creativity, helping students connect classroom concepts to real-world applications and develop lifelong skills that will serve them well beyond their time in school.

Looking Ahead

- October marks the start of the 2025–2026 4-H year, which means it's time for all Bath and Highland 4-H members and volunteers to re-enroll in the 4-H Online system at https://v2.4honline.com. This includes club members, leaders, and anyone planning to attend 4-H Camp, 4-H Congress, or other programs during the year. Youth planning to participate in the 2026 4-H & FFA Livestock Show and Sale or the Virginia 4-H State Horse Show must complete enrollment by December 1, 2025, to remain eligible for those programs.

 will open applications for
 Teen Counselor and
 Counselor-in-Training
 (CIT) positions in midNovember for the 2026
 4-H Camp season. Teens
 selected for these leadership roles will meet regu-



larly throughout the winter and spring to participate in training sessions that build teamwork, leadership, and youth development skills in preparation for camp. Serving as a counselor or CIT is a great opportunity for teens to grow in confidence and responsibility while making a lasting impact on younger campers. 4-H Camp will be held July 6–10, and planning is already underway for another fun, engaging, and memorable week at camp for Bath and Highland youth.

 After-school 4-H Cloverbud programs are underway in Bath County and will begin in Highland County this November! Designed for younger youth ages 5–8, these programs provide a fun, hands-on introduction to



4-H through activities that encourage creativity, teamwork, and learning by doing. Each meeting includes healthy snacks, crafts, and games centered around monthly themes that explore food, science, art, and nature. Cloverbud programs provide a fun, engaging introduction to 4-H, helping younger youth build a strong foundation for future participation in the program.
